

## **Employment Opportunity - Curriculum Developer**

West Coast N.E.S.T. (Nature. Education. Sustainability. Transformation.), a program of the Clayoquot Biosphere Trust, is seeking a creative and detail-oriented Curriculum Developer to lead the creation of high-quality, engaging, and accessible learning experiences. The successful candidate will work closely with program staff, subject matter experts, and community partners to create curriculum and educational resources that align with our goals and reflect the needs of diverse learners. The Curriculum Developer will:

- Design and develop learning objectives, lesson plans, and activities for middle and high school-aged learners;
- Collaborate with partners to ensure content is accurate, relevant, and aligned with learning objectives;
- Create assessments, facilitator guides, and supporting materials for both educators and students;
- Deliver training and support for facilitators and educators using the materials;
- Contribute to the dissemination and promotion of new learning resources;
- Prepare content and support the development of communications campaigns, as needed;
- Maintain organized records of drafts, resources and final deliverables; and
- Collect feedback and prepare summaries of completed work for reporting purposes.

## The ideal candidate should have:

- Experience in curriculum development or educational programming;
- Strong written communication skills and the ability to tailor content for different age groups;
- Strong interpersonal skills and a demonstrated understanding of inclusive education practices;
- A commitment to culturally grounded and interdisciplinary learning that values Indigenous knowledge and scientific inquiry;
- Excellent organizational skills and the ability to manage timelines and meet deadlines;
- A degree from a recognized post-secondary institution with specialization in education, science, technology, engineering, or mathematics, or some other relevant specialty;
- Familiarity with the B.C. curriculum is an asset;
- Familiarity with ArcGIS Storymaps and the *Science and Conservation in the Clayoquot Biosphere Region* StoryMap collection is an asset;
- A track record of working both independently and collaboratively; and
- Strong problem-solving skills, along with creative and critical thinking skills.

In addition, the ideal candidate will be detail-oriented, collaborative, and approach challenges with curiosity and a positive attitude. Preference will be given to candidates living in the Clayoquot Sound Biosphere region.
